The Perfect Time for Reflection

The Church Year thing can sometimes seem strange to people. Take for starters, Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is the day when we are reminded that we are dust. Ashes mean repentance. Ashes mean mourning. Ashes mean something has been burned, and destroyed, and lost. Ashes mean death. Ash Wednesday pulls us into Lent, when we reflect on our own shortcomings, on Jesus' forty days of loneliness and temptation in the wilderness, and on this world's darkness. We reflect on these things, and it prepares us for the joy of Easter.

But the trouble with the Church Year is that where we are in our own lives does not always quite connect with the dates on the calendar. Sometimes it's hard to get into the spirit of things at the right moment. Maybe, you see Lent coming around and you think, Oh I don't want to be sad right now! Things are going well! I love my life; I have wonderful friends; I want to praise God! And now I'm supposed to put on a serious face and think about death? Or maybe, you see Lent coming and you think: I know all about ashes and death. I have been walking on this road for a long time already. Maybe you live with a chronic illness and every day feels like a battle. Or you have watched people you love suffer and die. For you, Lent looks like more of the same, just more work among the burned-out wreck of the world. You've tasted the bread of affliction plenty, and what you'd really like instead is maybe some joy and gladness, for once.

But I wonder if we're thinking about Lent in the wrong spirit. Gardeners will tell you that ashes can actually make excellent fertilizer. Ash created by burning plant matter is full of calcium, potassium, magnesium, and other elements. It can restore the Ph-balance of overly acidic soil. This is one reason why forest ecosystems need occasional fires in order to spring back to life and thrive again. But of course, even in your own garden, you have to use ash sparingly. Too much will make the soil too alkaline. And you have to add water.

Fortunately, we enter this time of ashes already bringing water with us—the water of our baptism. Even Jesus needed this. He entered the wilderness of silence and meditation only after his own baptism. The waters of baptism are a sign and seal that, although we may be blackened with ash from our involvement in this wreck of a world, although we are dust, we are dust developing to new and abundant life with water.

So, what if we were to enter Lent thinking about ashes not as God's call to be miserable but instead to focus on the kind of abundance God offers, in those places we go to enter God's presence: in prayer, in worship, in good friendships, in times of rich and beautiful silence. If you plan to give something up for lent or engage in some discipline, do it in such a way that they help you see God's abundance. May the ashes of Lent mix with the waters of our baptism draw us into the abundance of God's presence. With love,

Property Ministry

What Happens in our Church Building When We're Not Here?

(From Jim Foster, FCC Property Manager) Did you know that more than 14 outside groups use our church building? We have a NA (Narcotics Anonymous) group in Brehm Hall on Sunday night and two AA groups that meet during the day on Monday. Bells rehearse here Monday night, and a dance group meets in Webster Hall. Oakton Community College runs English as a Second Language (ESL) classes here on Tuesday and Thursday. We have three Victory for Men support groups that meet on various evenings. A men's AA group meets on Wednesday night, when our choir also rehearses. Boy Scouts and Narcotics Anonymous (NA) meet here on Thursday. The Seventh Day Adventist Church uses our building Friday night and most of the day on Saturday. The First Congregational Preschool, which includes 60 children plus staff, operates here five days a week from 8:00am to 3:00pm. And, of course, our church's ministries, committees and other groups meet here throughout the month.

Also, starting March 5, the Faith Alliance Bible Church will be using the sanctuary and Webster Hall for four hours weekly, meeting on Sunday beginning at 11:00am.

Between all the outside groups plus our new group, our church will bring in almost \$48,500 a year by renting space to others.

Boilers and More...

Every year in the fall, the boiler company, Althoff Industries, comes out to get our church's two, 600-gallon steam boilers ready for the winter season. The company drains them and cleans the tubes and burners and checks all the seals. The boilers are refilled and when we start them up for the season, the company comes back after about a month to test the combustion. They run three tests with a low, medium, and high flame and then choose the appropriate settings for our heating season. Every three years, we can apply for a rebate from Nicor for combustion testing. Recently, after two months and many phone calls, FCC Property Manager Jim Foster was approved for a \$1,150 rebate from Nicor Gas. Thanks, Jim!

Financial Report

For the month of January, we had income of \$31,632 and expenses of \$32,831 for a monthly shortfall of \$1,199. However, year-to-date, we are still in a positive position of \$38,788. From our Historian, Nancy Meyer

As a follow up to my recent articles on Tower Hill, our pastor emeritus, Dr. William Grice, provided some wonderful current information as both Tower Hill and Pilgrim Park try to rebuild support after the pandemic. As you will read, THANK YOU to Dr. Grice for all his years of commitment to Tower Hill!

1) I presently serve (again) on the Outdoor Ministry System (ODM). This is the committee that oversees both Pilgrim Park and Tower Hill. I first started serving on the ODM in 1984 and pretty much served continuously (other than taking a mandatory year-off) until 2006. Now I'm back on ODM. I am also serving on FAB - which is the Financial Advisory Board for the Illinois Conference. Very interesting stuff about how the Conference manages to stay afloat.

2) As you know, churches are declining and closing. No UCC congregation has as many adults or children as they did "back in the day" when we were kids or had kids of our own. Consequently, both Pilgrim Park & Tower Hill are now more focused on adults, something I encouraged by our Autumn Adult Retreats which started in 1984. The Autumn Adult Retreat eventually grew to become an ODM Sponsored Retreat that included more than FCCDP members; however, the primary corps group were those from FCCDP and those who had been involved in MADD Camp.

3) You mentioned MADD Camp (Music, Art, Drama and Dance). MADD Camp started 1982. There were different directors for the camps in 1982 and 1983. When they didn't have a director for MADD Camp 1984, I volunteered. I directed MADD Camp from 1984 to 1993. Ten Camps. After that I also served two years as Music Person for Tenderfoot Camp. These were camps led by adults for children or (in MADD Camp) Junior High and Senior High Youth.

4) Then, in 2004 (I think), Janet Thompson and I took over co-directing Grandparents & Me Camp. Janet retired in 2018. I retired in 2019. As you know, G & Me Camp was what they refer to as an "Intergenerational Camp." This type of a camp brings together people of all ages: adults & children. You may recall in the 1970s, Rev. Garry Scheuer had organized Family Camps at Tower Hill. These had two weekends and the 5 days between the weekends. Some working people (primarily men in those days) might commute from Tower Hill to Chicago by driving early in the morning to catch the South Shore RR. Others might stay the two weekends, but return home to work on the weekdays. Vivian Rivard & Rev. Ernie Grant told me some stories that I still remember. :) And I will add FCCDP was not alone in having Family Camps for a week or long weekends at both Pilgrim Park & Tower Hill.

5) In addition to the ODM sponsored events/camps and Family Camps sponsored by churches, High School or Confirmation Retreats were quite popular. Since FCCDP did not have a Youth Minister when I arrived in December 1979, I took over the responsibilities of leading the Senior High Youth Group. In the spring of 1980, we held a weekend Retreat at Tower Hill. Rev. David Laaser continued this long-established tradition of having Autumn and Spring Retreats. It varied between Pilgrim Park (usually in the Autumn) and Tower Hill (usually in the Spring). Prior to going to Pilgrim Park in the Fall, Retreats were held at Pleasant Valley Farm in McHenry. This property was owned and operated by the Community Renewal Society, which eventually closed it and sold the property for house lots where McMansions were built.....
