#### "Cultivating the Garden of Life"

"In the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens, when no plant of the field was yet in the earth and no herb of the field had yet sprung up—for the Lord God had not caused it to rain upon the earth, and there was no one to till the ground...the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and there God put the man whom God had formed." - Genesis 2:4b-7

## **Backpack Project Prepares for New School Year**

The Backpack Ministry begins again in September. We are collecting food in preparation for this outreach mission. We supply weekend food for students at North Elementary School in Des Plaines as we have for the past few years. In addition to food donations, we will need volunteers to pack the individual bags, and to deliver them (usually on Fridays, but the school schedule sometimes dictates other days of the week). A signup sheet for the Fall semester will be placed in the church office once the social worker at North School has been consulted on the school calendar.

A list of items is available on a handout on the credenza outside the church office and on Sundays beside the bulletins at the west sanctuary door. The most needed items include: Boxed macaroni and cheese, canned pasta with meat, condensed soup, canned stew [or chunky soup, hash, chili, or the like], canned vegetables [±15 oz.], peanut butter [±16 oz. in plastic], and jelly [± 20 oz. in plastic].

Deliveries can be made in any vehicle from compact hatchback to SUV. The Community Backpack Project has estimated that this year it will cost \$23 per bag, or \$870 for one student for the entire school year. This past year we were fortunate to have generous contributions from church members; however, we were still dependent on donations provided by the Community Backpack Project to meet our commitment. The church maintains a Restricted Account expressly for this mission and it would be greatly appreciated if those seeking to aid in this mission could make a contribution to First Congregational Church with Backpack Fund designated on the memo line.

## Gifts & Memorials

In Loving Memory of Midge Wolfram from Sharen Gasior

#### From our Historian, Nancy Meyer

Although I'd been in the 1151 Oakwood Ave. parsonage many times, including being part of the group who cleaned it from top to bottom in preparation for the arrival of Rev. Co DuToit in 2008, my most recent visit to the house was for a delicious lasagna dinner after the Second Time Around Sale. (The DuToits purchased it from FCCDP in 2013.) I was amazed at the recent upgrades to the first-floor bathroom and the kitchen and was allowed to take pictures. I shared them with Mary Ethel (Meth) Brehm, older daughter of Dr. Brehm, who was our minister when the parsonage was built in 1950. Meth emailed back, saying she'd just been looking at old photo albums with one of her sons and saw the pictures taken when it was under construction. She mailed them to me to share with you. Meth was in college when the parsonage was built so she didn't spend much time there, graduating from college in 1953 and moving to Albuquerque, but Dr. and Mrs. Brehm enjoyed it until his retirement to New Mexico in 1967. Minister's study was on far right as you went in front door so when people came for counseling, they could easily exit without disturbing the family, and for privacy. Meth also added the sloping roof was modeled after the church's roof.

From our Centennial book: Charles Edward Stade, just beginning his career and soon to become one of the outstanding church architects in America, was retained to plan a home especially suited to church purposes. When his design proved to be beyond the available finances, Charles and his father, Chris E. Stade, came to our rescue by building the new parsonage at cost strictly as a service to the church. The land at the corner of Oakwood and Jeannette was made available at a nominal price by its owners, Walter L. Plew, A. L. Webster and Dr. A. M. Purves. The total cost including the land was \$28,000. Later when it became apparent that the adjoining lot to the south was needed, the Christian Builders Class undertook to raise the \$1,500 needed for its purchase. Spurred on by a challenge gift of \$750 from Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Webster, the class soon accomplished its goal. Men of the church organized work parties for the planting of the lawn and the Social Union paid for the shrubbery.

The new parsonage was dedicated in a simple ceremony attended by church officers and board members on March 14, 1950. A series of open house receptions was held for all people of the church and numerous church boards and organizations were entertained at their regular meeting times. By the end of the year over 800 visitors had been received in the new home of the minister's family.
