Following Christ, We Connect a Diversity of People with each other and with God

"He said to them, but who do you say that I am?" - Matthew 16:15

Labor Day is a time when we celebrate the value of hard work and the contributions we make to society. It is also a crucial time to remember that amidst our diligent efforts, there exists a profound importance in taking a break, finding rest, and understanding our true identity. In a world that often glorifies busyness and constant productivity, we can draw inspiration from unexpected sources, such as the tale of Rip Van Winkle and also from the teachings of Jesus, to reevaluate our perspectives on work, rest, and identity.

Rip Van Winkle, a character from American literature, stands as a symbol of the counternarrative to the prevailing notion that virtue solely arises from ceaseless toil. While phrases like "Up and at 'em" advocate for early rising and industriousness, Rip Van Winkle's story challenges this by demonstrating the power of rest. His twenty-year slumber leads to a moment of awakening, a rediscovery of his own identity, and a realization that time spent in respite doesn't equate to idleness or laziness.

In Matthew 16:15, Jesus asks his disciples, "But who do you say that I am?" This question delves into the heart of identity and understanding. Just as Rip Van Winkle's identity became obscured during his long nap, we too can lose sight of our true selves in the relentless pursuit of success. The modern world, influenced by the Protestant work ethic and the pressures of industrialization, often blinds us to the significance of rest and self-reflection.

The busyness that surrounds us can lead to a misidentification of what defines us. Like Peter, who initially misunderstood Jesus' true identity, we can mistake our purpose, seeking prominence and worldly success rather than embracing the deeper, more fulfilling peace that Jesus offers. Jesus had a communion table that was round. The supper pictures have it wrong. The round table, challenges hierarchical structures. There is no head of the table. It invites all to partake without distinction, reflecting a broader message of unity and belonging.

In our pursuit of success, we can neglect the importance of shared experiences and the value of granting ourselves and others the grace of rest. The modern world can feel like two lines at the airport. With all my flying I have joined TSA pre-check, which most of the time had only a few people who were just zipping through and the lines. The regular lines, however, are typically super long. I saw Jesus standing there in the regular line, showing us an alternative perspective. He invites us to flip the script, just as Rip Van Winkle did, and find value in moments of rest and contemplation. Through these breaks, we can better perceive our identity, purpose, and the world that Jesus envisioned—a world that values each individual's well-being and contribution.

Jesus' teachings include the ministry of the nap, reminding us that true peace and growth arise from moments of stillness. Just as Rip Van Winkle's rest led to his reawakening, our periods of rest can lead to a deeper understanding of our identity and purpose. When we pause, we enable our minds and spirits to align with God's intentions for us.

As we approach Labor Day, let's reflect on the wisdom of Rip Van Winkle and the teachings of Jesus. Let's remember that taking a break doesn't negate our work ethic; rather, it enhances it. By embracing moments of rest, we gain clarity about our identity, release ourselves from the chains of relentless busyness, and align ourselves with Jesus' vision of a world where all are valued and included.

In the spirit of true rest, let us find comfort in the communion of nap and identity. Just as Jesus asked, "But who do you say that I am?" let us ask ourselves, "Who do we say that we are?" May we discover the answer not only in our work but in our moments of respite—a time to rediscover our true selves and to stand in unity with a world envisioned by Jesus, where all find their place at the table.

Backpack Project Prepares for New School Year

A huge thank you to the congregation for donations that have come in throughout August. Although we do not yet have a handle on the number of students for whom First Congregational will be supplying weekend nourishment at North Elementary this coming school year, we do know that the Community Backpack Project is expecting a hefty increase in requests, so however many we as a congregation can fulfill will be greatly appreciated. We expect to return to deliveries the week of September 4, after Labor Day. The following items can be used now and will be in continuous need: canned vegetables [±15 oz.], canned stew [±15 oz.], canned pasta [±15 oz. with meat], boxed macaroni and cheese [several stores have their own labels, often on sale; just a hint]. Twice a month we have sent beans and rice, so canned kidney beans [±15 oz.] and one-pound bags of rice will constantly be needed. Once we have conferred with the Social Worker at North School, we will post a sign-up sheet in the church office for packing bags and delivering them to the school. Finance Committee

Financial Report

During Fiscal 2023 (which ended on June 30), we had total income in our Church's general fund of \$353,279 and expenses of \$322,416. Special thanks to church members and friends who gave of their financial resources to meet and exceed their pledges - and who gave of their time and talents in many fundraising efforts throughout the year. And special recognition and thanks to our church staff and Ministries, who continue to more with less, to maintain and expand church programs in our building, the community, and beyond.

The Church Council voted to move \$16,000 of the end-of-year surplus into the Minister's Housing Allowance Fund, to replace money withdrawn from that fund over the past year. An additional \$14,883 has been transferred to the Contingency Fund to cover unexpected future expenses, as well as staff recognition.

FROM OUR HISTORIAN, NANCY MEYER

Last month my article was about building the "new" parsonage at 1151 Oakwood Avenue in 1950, with Dr. and Mrs. Brehm, their 2 daughters and his mother as first occupants. Dr. and Mrs. James Spicer and their 3 daughters were next from 1969-1971. Rev. & Mrs. Garry Scheuer and their 6 children, 1972-1979, were followed by Dr. and Mrs. William Grice and their 4 sons from 1979 to 2008, and now Rev. and Mrs. Co DuToit as empty nesters with their 3 children now out on their own. I can't imagine where all these children slept, especially the "6 pack".

Although no addition has been made, the original construction provided plumbing for adding a 3rd bathroom, which never happened! Dr. Grice shared some information about some of the upgrades made over the years: "From what I understand, Jim Spicer added the flooring and paneling to the Oakwood parsonage basement, the Scheuers may have done some stuff, too. I also built a model railroad in a room Garry Scheuer used as his woodworking shop. Garry had also painted murals on several bedroom walls and had an old stand-up phone booth upstairs so his kids could have some privacy when they made phone calls to talk with their friends. Garry and Carolyn had their bedroom - as did the Brehms - on the main floor." I know the DuToits made some wonderful upgrades to the lower level where gatherings have been held.

When I shared the picture of the recent upgrade made by the DuToits to the kitchen, removing window & adding doors to back yard, Mary (Brehm) Norris commented with picture: "Original kitchen with cabinets dividing the "cooking" area from the breakfast nook in the background."





Also added by Dr. Grice: "While we lived in the parsonage, and because of the age of the house, the Church's Board of Trustees felt the need to make improvements to maintain the value of the property. Over the course of years, the kitchen was remodeled. Oak cabinets (the ones shown in the photo) were installed. Other upgrades included installation of a fence around the backyard, a new roof, new siding, new furnace and air conditioning, new carpeting, expanding the parking area when the concrete driveway was replaced, and installation of several second floor windows. These were accomplished in addition to the normal responsibilities to maintain the property on regular basis."
