## **A New Future**

*The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, “Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen.”*

- Luke 24:5 (NRSV)

It is the second half of the year, and we are slowly, but surely getting back to “normal,” or at least what we would consider as normal. There is no doubt that things have change since we ventured through the pandemic. We are not off the hook yet as we are a global community and constraining the pandemic is still an ongoing international crisis. South Africa has just gone into lockdown because of the Delta variant and a significant rise in cases and deaths. I mention this country as we are planning to travel to South Africa in August for my niece’s wedding. And we are reminded again that things will probably be never “back to normal” again. On this note I would like to share one of our Daily Devotionals, authored by Lillian Daniel entitled: *“The Resurrection Is Radical”*

After twelve months (of course now slightly more!) of this pandemic, if our greatest desire is to get back to where we were a year ago, we have missed the memo from the Holy Spirit.

The women get the news when they are looking for Jesus’ body in the empty tomb. “Why do you look for the living among the dead?” Why do you look backwards for God’s future?

If all you want is a sentimental sign of spring, I’m sure you can find a crocus growing in a graveyard somewhere, but the promise of new life is more than that. What is dead is gone because it has been transformed into something entirely new. So much so that after the resurrection, when Jesus ran into his closest friends, they did not recognize him. They were looking for the living

among the dead. They were massaging their memories, clutching to sacred scrapbooks from a pretend past, the kind that grows more perfect the further we are from it. When Jesus actually showed up on the street where they lived, they almost missed him.

New life does not mean more of the same. So why settle for some pre-pandemic nostalgic normalcy for your church, your children, your institutions, your society, your schools, or your street? Why do you look for the living among the dead? Resurrection is the radical change that renders our run-of-the-mill desires unrecognizable. Christ is risen and there's no going back.

May God open our hearts to his future.

## Tower Hill Mission Trip June 2021: From Drips to Ditches

This year 13 people convened at our Conference Camp, Tower Hill, in Sawyer, Michigan. Included was our stalwart companion, Mary “Stiletto” Buchholz from Kokomo, Indiana. This whole adventure was organized and coordinated by Jim Foster. Meals were produced by Sue Almerigi and Stiletto; Anthony Almerigi made a special contribution: a Campfire Dutch Oven Paella. They fed us really well.

We occupied the Lodge, the newest building at the camp. It accommodates 20 people comfortably.

The Camp Director, Rev. Tracy Heilman, gave Jim a list of projects to be done. They included:

- ❖ **Trenching** two 100’ ditches and installing a “French” Drain (later revised to a “South African” Drain) and covering it with gravel. This is to control drainage behind the Schrag Conference Center.
- ❖ **Power washing decks and railings and staining** white railings and brown decks surrounding the Dining Hall, Schrag Conference Center and the Anderson Building.
- ❖ **Installing four large light fixtures** in the maintenance building. We brought them from church; they were previously used in Webster Hall
- ❖ **Creating a flower garden** under the large white cross on the hill to attract and feed butterflies.
- ❖ **Move bunks, paint the building facings and trim low hanging branches** in the “Pines”, a remote facility on a hill.
- ❖ **Trim trees** and remove debris throughout the camp.
- ❖ **Remove grates and clear gutters** on two buildings and clear roofs as needed.
- ❖ **Spread bark chips.**
- ❖ **Clear forest of dead branches.**
- ❖ **Mow 20 acres of grass.**
- ❖ **Clear cement area at Marshall Hall and clean and move benches.**
- ❖ **Use leaf blower to clear decks on all “A” Frame buildings.**

On the third day Jim Foster asked Rev. Tracy if she had more tasks. (She did not expect us to finish so soon.) She did come up with more for us to do!

**We did our mission with gusto, competence – and joy.**

*Now our Conference Camp is better prepared to accept children and adults for new post-pandemic adventures.*

### Financial Report

Income for the month of May was \$17,646, while expenses were \$22,850, resulting in a negative position for the month of \$5,204. With just one month to go in our current fiscal year, we are running \$8,596 in the red year-to-date. If we end the fiscal year (June 30) in a negative position, funds will need to be taken from our Contingency Fund to balance our income and expenses for the year.

## From our Historian, Nancy Meyer

The red “tongues of fire” Pentecost banners have been displayed in our sanctuary for the past several weeks. Although I wrote about them when I first started doing these Historian articles back in 2009, I recently found more information about who made them and when, from an article in *The Tidings* on June 20, 1976.

Quoting the article: Pentecost is a feast day for Jews and Christians alike. The word Pentecost is derived from the Greek and means the fiftieth day. For the Jewish people it is the fiftieth day after Passover. In Palestine the climate is such that they have two harvests every year, and it was on the day of Pentecost that they had a feast of the first fruits, of the first harvest.

In the book of Acts, we read of the happening which took place on this Jewish feast day. In the second chapter it records that the disciples were in one place together, and the Holy Spirit came upon them “like a rush of a mighty wind,” and it was as if tongues of fire came down upon them. And it was from this beginning that the church was born and the faith spread out into the world. It is the birthday of the church.

Again from this June 1976 *Tidings* article: To bring more significance to this day of days and feast of feasts, we approached several ladies in our church who were handy with needles and thread. They willingly volunteered to help us out to make the banners. These picture the symbolic tongues of fire that came down upon the first Christians. The Holy Spirit inspired them to go tell the world the “good news.” We are most grateful to Rose Sayad and June Gibbs for their work, and for the help given by Mary Dinick and Barbara Weaver. The banners add much to our worship, and bring some color to the season of Pentecost. This is the second year we have used the Pentecost banners, and we appreciate the dedicated work that brought them to us.
